
Canadian songwriter Feist attracted a lot of attention in 2007, and her biggest hit of the year, "1 2 3 4," was a true multimedia sensation. It won the Juno award for single of the year, charted on at least six US *Billboard* charts, and was featured in a commercial for Apple's iPod Nano.

Producer Ben Mink played rhythm guitar on the record in dropped-D tuning. For the riff, make sure to follow the "palm muting" symbol by dampening the strings with the heel of your picking hand to give your strums a chunky sound. Mink played the heavy A and G power chords noted on some choruses, but also opted for barre-chord shapes (altered slightly to account for the lowered sixth

string). In the middle of the third verse, play the riff twice before moving on to the third and fourth lines. After the double chorus near the end, Feist ad-libs the vocal line while cycling through the D–Em7–Bm–G progression a few times, and then launches into the final lyrics written here.

When Feist performs the tune live, she often plays it in standard tuning. To play it her way, just leave that low sixth string off of the first three riff chords, and play a standard rootposition G chord for the last chord of the riff. Substitute root-position counterparts for the rest of the chords, moving to standard G and A barre chords in the chorus.
